

Worldview Basics

Worldview definition: The framework you use to interpret the world and your place in it and which is the basis of your decisions and actions (Sunshine, Phillips, Brown, Stonestreet)

Iceberg principle: Outward values and behavior are shaped by our worldview. What we *think* informs how we *act*. Our worldview underlies how we interact with ourselves, with others, and with God.



Framework for understanding worldviews

(Origin, Problem, Solution, Hope)

1. Origin, purpose, and meaning

- Where did everything come from?
- What is the nature of ultimate reality?
- Why are we here?
- What is a human being? What are we made for?

2. Basic problem

- What is wrong with the world?
- What is wrong with us?
- Is there right and wrong?
- Where do pain and suffering come from?

3. Main solution

- How is the world's basic problem solved?
- 4. Hope
 - Where does our hope lie?
 - What do we have to look forward to in the future?
 - What happens after we die?
 - Where is history going?

Christian Worldview, Unpacked

- 1. Origin, purpose, meaning: **CREATION** Genesis 1:1; 1:26-28; John 17:3
- 2. Basic problem: FALL Genesis 3; Romans 5:12; Romans 8:20-22; Ephesians 2:1-3

- 3. Main solution: **REDEMPTION** John 3:16; Romans 5:1; 2 Corinthians 5:21; Ephesians 2:4-10
- 4. Hope: NEW CREATION
 2 Corinthians 5:17; Romans 8:26-30; Revelation 21:1-5

Responding to Other Worldviews

Some assumptions:

Engage constructively by asking questions

- What
 - What do you mean by that?
- Why
 - What led you to that conclusion?
- Gently challenge the worldview (assuming you perceive a problem)
 - So if you believe x, does that mean you also believe y?
 - Can you clear this up for me...?
- Permission to share an alternative
 - Have you considered ...?
 - I'm not sure that's going to work. Can I share an alternative?
